

11 – 12 November 2010 | How to set up and run a data service

The Digital Preservation Coalition is pleased to support **three fully funded scholarships** to attend ***How to set up and run a data service: the challenges of the social sciences*** at the UK Data Archive in Colchester, 11th-12st November 2010.

Participants will learn about the strategies and practices used by the UK Data Archive in our daily work. The Archive has over 40 years of experience in the areas of selecting, ingesting, curating and providing access to data. We are a designated Place of Deposit for The National Archives and are internationally acknowledged experts in this field. The surgeries will enable participants to engage with Archive experts on an informal basis, to pursue their own lines of enquiry and to look behind the scenes at some of our specialized activities. Attendance at the course costs 100 GBP per person. However, in November 2010 the Digital Preservation Coalition is pleased to offer **three fully funded scholarships** which meet the costs of the course. Applications are welcomed from DPC members and associates. The scholarship covers all tuition fees, course materials, access to online resources, lunch and refreshments. Travel, accommodation and subsistence are not funded.

Successful applicants will be asked to help promote the course and the work of the coalition.

Eligibility:

The scholarship is available to DPC members, associates and personal members. A full list of eligible institutions is supplied at the end of this document. Prospective members may also apply. Only one scholarship is available per member.

How to apply:

Applications should be received no later than 12:00 on 15th October 2010 by email to carol@dpconline.org. They should be no more than three pages (A4) and should include:

- a **covering letter** which matches the application to the criteria below
- a **one page CV** of the applicant
- the **explicit approval** from your line manager or other senior executive
- a statement indicating your **relationship to a DPC member institution**.

The covering letter should describe:

- The role that the course will play in your career development
- The benefits that accrue to a DPC member from your attendance
- Your function in your organisation and how this relates to Digital Preservation

Preference will be given to: junior staff who have not previously attended DPC events; staff who would not otherwise be able to attend specialist training; and staff who will be able to apply learning outcomes of the course or specific modules directly and speedily to their work. Applicants should mention if any of these conditions pertain to their own applications.

Applications will be assessed by a selection committee on the above criteria whose decision is final. Successful applicants will be notified on or before 20th October 2010.

Conditions of grant

It is our aim that your scholarship will deliver benefits to a DPC member, so the DPC makes no special requirement or condition though you will be asked to participate in reasonable

promotional and evaluation of the DPC and its Leadership Programme. However, we recommend that the member organisation which has supported your application discusses appropriate outcomes with you.

Eligible individuals

Eligible consortia

Individuals associated with or funded through the following agencies are eligible:

- members of the Archives Records Association (formerly the Society of Archivists)

- project staff funded by Creative Scotland (formerly Scottish Arts Council)
- staff of institutions that are members of Publishers' Licensing Society

Applicants from the Publishers' Licensing Society should contact the DPC offices in the first instance.

The DPC may pass the details of the application to designated contacts within these organisations as part of their assessment.

Prospective members

Prospective members of the DPC are eligible for these scholarships. Organisations or individuals seeking to join the DPC should file their membership applications by 10th October to qualify.

Other grants from the DPC Leadership Programme

The DPC is currently offering three scholarships to attend the Digital Preservation Training Programme in London in October and expects to do so again at the start of 2011, though the number and date have not been confirmed.

The DPC seeks to support all relevant training so that members and their workforces can more quickly develop the skills necessary to ensure that our digital memory is available tomorrow. Providers of such training courses are invited to discuss with the DPC executive whether these would be appropriate for grants from the DPC Leadership Programme.
