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NEDCC Digital Preservation Needs Assessment Findings – Disaster Planning


2005 Institutional Surveys:

- None of the institutions surveyed had a digital disaster plan
- None had incorporated digital production, content, or storage into their existing disaster plans
- 2008 Aggregate Surveys from "SODA" Workshops
 27% had Disaster Planning in Policies
 23.4% had in Procedures

Traditionally, we have not been prepared


