Only what can be reasonably supplied by the producer – and preferably captured in an automated way



What we need for each file

- 1. Filepath
- 2. Filename
- 3. [Description]
- 4. Folder or File
- 5. Date
- 6. Checksum
- 7. Copyright
- 8. Legal Status
- 9. Held By
- 10. + closure information

Main challenges encountered when we released our first born-digital records onto our catalogue

- o The date is wrong!
- o That file name is meaningless!
- o Don't you check spellings?!
- That file name doesn't meet our cataloguing standard!

The challenges we experienced

- Varying levels of compliance with naming conventions, with some meaningless file titles
- Spelling mistakes... but in some cases, what is the "correct" spelling?

How we are addressing these challenges

- Internal discussions on the potential need to revise our cataloguing standards for born-digital records
- Research within our Systems
 Development team to increase the
 ease with which end-users can search
 and browse our records and capture
 the untapped opportunities offered
 by born-digital material
